Help Protect **Your Kids from Lead Poisoning**

Early Steps You Can Take to Reduce the Lead Dust in Your Home

Lead dust is a common source of lead poisoning, but you can help limit your child's risk with a few simple cleaning tips.

Where does lead dust come from?

Household dust can have lead from cracked, chipped, or peeling leadbased paint. Kids and adults can also track lead dust into your home on their shoes after playing our working outside in or near dirt!

How to Clean Up Lead Dust

- 2 tablespoons of dishwasher detergent*
- 1 gallon bucket of warm water
- 1 gallon warm water for rinsing

Disposable rags or paper towels

A mop

- Latex gloves
- A scrubber
- Spray bottle (optional)

* Regular dish soap will not work the same way - it must be dishwasher detergent.

- 1 Start your cleaning where your child spends the most time.
- 2 Pick up all clothes and toys and throw away all trash.
- 3 Put on gloves to protect yourself.
- 4 Mix dishwasher detergent in one bucket of warm water.
- 5 Wipe off all windowsills, wells, molding, and baseboards using a rag or paper towel and the soap mixture.
- Use clean rags and water from the clean water bucket to rinse the surfaces you just cleaned.
- 7 Mop your floors, steps, corners, and under your furniture
- Rinse your floors with 8 clean, warm water.
- 9 Flush all dirty water down the toilet.
- **10** Wash all toys, blankets, sheets, rugs, curtains, etc.

Lead Dust Clean Up Check List

Vacuum/sweep floors Wet mop & rinse floors Wash baseboards & rinse


Wet wipe window sills & rinse

- Vacuum furniture
- Wash curtains
- Wet dust blinds
- Wash ceiling fans
- Wash refrigerator

- Wash knickknacks
- Wash counters
- Wash dishes
- Scrub sinks
- Wash toys
- Wash Tub
- Wash stove

Safety Tips

- Do not use bleach with soap.
- Wet sweep before you mop by spraying the floor with your soap mixture and then sweeping. Follow with mopping.
